



Windsor family sues Customs

WINDSOR -- Relatives of a murdered Windsor man are suing border agents after his killer was allowed to enter Canada.

The family of Brian Bolyantu plans to file a lawsuit seeking over \$1 million in damages from Canada Customs and the Federal Government.

Bolyantu was shot and killed in March, 2003 by an American who crossed into Canada with a semi-automatic pistol in his boot.

That was despite an order banning him from Canada because of his criminal record.

Lawyer Greg Monforton, who represents the family, says Bolyantu would be alive today if customs officials had not made mistakes.

Monforton says an official at the customs booth twice tried to search the killer's name in a computer, but spelled the name wrong both times.

None of the allegations have been proven in court.

Last week, a jury found 22-year-old Jack Pharr guilty of second-degree murder in Bolyantu's death.
